Musical Progression in Outer London Boroughs

INTRODUCTION

Between November 2013 and December 2014, Roundhouse and Wired4Music came together to consult young people aged 16-25 across the outer London boroughs¹ of Enfield, Haringey and Barnet. We wanted to find out about young people's musical journeys, what opportunities they have to make music and what they want in the future. We also wanted to strengthen the voices of young people in these boroughs, deepening the connection between their ideas and the musical offer from their respective music education hubs.

AIMS

The aims of the project were:

- To amplify the voices of young people from Enfield, Barnet and Haringey in pan-London conversations about the future of music education, training and opportunities.
- To find out more about what young people across these boroughs currently know about the opportunities available; what opportunities they think are missing and to initiate a forum for active discussion between young people and service providers; from music and youth services, to schools and art organisations.

THE PROCESS

We designed a consultation process that enabled young people to discuss career pathways and opportunities to progress, discover creative opportunities available across London and feed their views and experiences into a London-wide conversation about the future of music for young people. By working closely with music and youth services, we set up a number of consultations with young people from each borough. Each consultation session was led by Wired4Music staff and cofacilitated by young leaders.

Enfield: we met with three separate groups of young people at the Dugdale Centre, Ponders End Youth Centre and Chace School; bringing them altogether for a final session at the end. This process was effective but took time in order to build strong relationships with Enfield service providers. **Barnet**: we met with three separate, small groups of young people at Canada Villa and Finchley Youth Centres. There was no final session to bring the groups together making the process somewhat fragmented.

Haringey: the aim was to meet with one large group in Haringey. Unfortunately only two young people attended the session at Alexandra Palace so we were unable to capture a wide range of

opinions from young people. We were, however, joined by a number of partner organisations from the borough.

COMMON FINDINGS AND CREATING A MUSICAL WISH LIST

Over the course of these consultations, we were struck by the common threads between what the young people were feeding back in each borough. Tying this feedback in with additional consultations which have since taken place in Brent, as well as conversations taking place within and through Wired4Music, we have compiled the findings from the 'musical wish lists' created by the young people consulted in all four boroughs:

- Networks & communication to connect with other creative young people, to share ideas and find new partners for collaboration and to receive information on all of the opportunities available both within their boroughs and London- wide.
- Platforms to perform to peers and hear new music performed by peers, to be celebrated and encouraged; to build confidence and develop as artists.
- Access to free or low cost, high quality spaces and facilities to write and create music, collaborate, jam and to be inspired.
- Professional development to enable young people to develop their skills, learn about the industry and explore career pathways.

CHALLENGES

The consultations were hugely positive in reflecting the great musical opportunities available to young people through the music and youth services in outer London boroughs that do not have a great wealth of culture on offer outside of this. There were, however, some challenges faced and areas for improvement. These included:

- **Time**: trust-building with the local authorities, schools, youth projects and young people themselves takes time and there is often red tape to overcome.
- Staff and sustainability: a number of staff involved in the original consultation plans left midway through the process. Handovers and following up were not always reliable or effective, which had time implications and, on occasion, lack of support.
- Communications leading to fragmented offers: there was often a disconnect or divide between service providers working in the same boroughs; with some colleagues unaware of what the other was offering. This meant that young people were often unaware of opportunities on offer within their own home boroughs.

CONCLUSIONS & RECOMMENDATIONS

Our findings indicate that there are huge similarities between the needs of musical young people in each of the four boroughs we worked with and the 'wish list' can be viewed as the first recommendation. The findings also indicate that organisations could improve the offer to young

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people by staying connected with colleagues inside and outside of their borough, signposting young people and therefore creating a wider pool of opportunities. The process of these consultations is threefold in that it:

- 1. Gives young people a voice
- 2. Identifies and responds to local need
- 3. Strengthens partnerships both within and outside of boroughs

A number of young people from each of the boroughs signed up to Wired4Music and have since contributed to conversations around the manifesto, as well as joining youth-led discussions at the Arts Council (Haringey representative) and our annual youth voice symposium Rising Futures; held in partnership with Roundhouse (Brent representative). Wired4Music recommend that organisations, music hubs and local authorities speak directly with young people; giving them a voice and platform to regularly feedback the information such as is found in this report, and to have a say in shaping their musical experiences. Organisations should, therefore, move away from programming *for* young people and toward programming *with* young people. This format is mutually beneficial and it inspires and enables organisations to create high quality offers by connecting them directly with the audience their programmes are aimed at.
